Director's Note

In my schooling from kindergarten in the 1970s to my graduate degree programs in the mid-1990s, not once in my two-and-a-half decades of institutional education did the thought of gun violence inside my school ever cross my mind. On April 20, 1999, the United States came to grips with a school shooting and attempted bombing at Columbine High School in Columbine, Colorado, which took the lives of 15 people (including the suicide of the two teenage shooters) as well as more than 20 with gunshot injuries. This event in 1999 seems like the start of a 25-year American nightmare where countless mass shootings have occurred in our society—whether at a school, a nightclub, a church, or a temple.

26 Pebbles by Eric Ulloa is a string of monologues from actual townspeople of Newtown, Connecticut. Each monologue represents the actual words from the actual peoples' experiences who experienced a tragic day on December 14, 2012, when a lone teenage shooter mur dered his own mother and then drove to Sandy Hook Elementary School and murdered 20 elementary school-aged children and six educators as well as himself. Twenty-eight people died that day.

The cast and crew of this show do not have the answers on how to make this night-mare stop. As we've been rehearsing this show for the past six weeks, the CDC recently reported that the number one cause of death of young people in the United States is gun violence – a first in this country. In the past 25 years, what the hell has happened to us? Why do we continue to turn the channel on our children? Why do we continue making movies, TV shows, or music that glorify violence? Why do we let our kids get lost on their phones and the Internet where there are few safeguards? Why do we keep electing politicians who aren't looking out for our safety?

This show is hard; night in and night out, this crew and cast emotionally explore the depths of tragedy that are unknown to most. They display their vulnerability and their truth in this production. It is a heavy, heavy weight to bear for six weeks; however, it is nothing compared to the heavier lifelong weight of the people of Newtown and those affected directly by the Sandy Hook shooting. The light and life in their eyes are a little more dim; they struggle every day with the loss, and they struggle every day with America's unwillingness to wake up to this mental health crisis in our kids and this fervent zeal and fascination for guns in this country.

Our hope with this show is to build on the Justice Theater Project's mission of continuing social justice conversations through provocative theatrical productions. Somehow, in some way, the people of Newtown emerge and are resilient and hopeful in their fight to make sure this never happens again. As an audience member of this production, we ask you to get sad, get angry, and get human. Harness the same resilience, hope, and love that the people of Newtown show us, and find ways to continue this crucially important conversation. Be a source of comfort, joy, hope, and change.
