

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

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

What was your day like on December 14? Take me from waking up in the morning to your head on the pillow at night.


Does this shooting shake your faith? Can (any form of) God exist when tragedies like this happen?

FROM THE DIRECTOR

A Matter of Perspective

Winnie the Pooh and Piglet are tracking a woozle in the snow. As the single track grows into more and more tracks, they are convinced they will soon catch their woozle. But Christopher Robin, sitting atop the hill, reveals the truth: Pooh and Piglet are unknowingly walking in a circle around the hill, and the tracks are the ones they have made themselves in the snow.

The old saying is, "Never ASSume. You only make an ASSUME out of U and ME." Without all the facts, it is easy to jump to conclusions. When we only look at an issue through a single lens, we often miss what is in our figurative peripheral vision. It's only when things are examined from multiple angles that we begin to comprehend where the truth may lie.

Reginald Rose's classic TWELVE ANGRY MEN, adapted for the stage into TWELVE ANGRY JURORS by Christopher Sergel, locks us in a room with twelve very different people with twelve different life experiences. Each believes they are "right." The circumstances of their hasty decisions could mean life or death for the defendant. As they dig deeper and examine the evidence from all sides, only then do they begin to discover how their own biases, prejudices, and assumptions may have led them astray.

In Harper Lee's masterpiece, TO KILL A MOCKINGBIRD, Atticus Finch tells his daughter Scout, "You never really understand a person until you consider things from (their) point of view...until you climb into (their) skin and walk around in it." Our wonderful cast, diverse in culture, gender, age, and background, is the living embodiment of Atticus' advice. It is wise to consider as many viewpoints as possible when seeking the truth.

It is all a matter of perspective.



Olivia Allen (Justice Theater Arts Administrator/Wardrobe Supervisor) graduated with a BFA in Directing from Emory & Henry College in 2019.
