#### We are Proud to Present...

We are Proud to Present... is a comedic dramatization of the largely forgotten Herero and Namaqua genocide which took place in Namibia between 1904-1907 when the region was a German colony after Germany confiscated tribal lands and the Herero people rebelled. The retribution over four years by German soldiers resulted in more than 65,000 deaths.

Award-winning playwright Jackie Sibblies Drury collides the political with the personal in a play that is irreverently funny and seriously brave. A group of actors gathers to tell the little-known story as a "presentation" of the first genocide of the 20th century. We Are Proud to Present ... takes place largely in a rehearsal room that descends from collaborative to absurd as a group of idealistic actors—three black and three white—attempt to recreate the extinction of the Herero tribe at the hands of their German colonizers. Along the way, they test the limits of empathy as their own stories, subjectivities, assumptions, and prejudices catalyze their theatrical process.

As the full force of a horrific past crashes into the good intentions of the present, what seemed a faraway place and time comes all too close to home. Just whose story are they telling? This gut-wrenching, intelligent, often funny—until it's not—play asks us, what happens when we only have one side of the story?

The cast and crew have had powerful conversations about comfort, identity, and privilege and worked with two volunteer social workers. Audiences will be surprised that a play with such a serious subject creates dialogue, optimism, and inspiration.

Director Amelia Lumpkin, making her directing debut with The Justice Theater Project, shares, "The story is challenging unto itself, it is easier to face if you look at it as a long-ago atrocity of the Herero at the hands of Germans at the turn of the century, but through the course of the play, we learn it is really about the ways the story touches us closer to home and where we can find ourselves. The play figuratively invites the audience into the conversation during the show. The characters are relatable - they talk like me, are modern, the language is relatable. Jackie's structure and layers in the script are as deep as Shakespeare, but written for a modern-day audience to feel the impact."

"This show can also impact our community by helping to deepen our conversations about race, violence, and history. These issues are often the elephant in the room. Humor, stories, and representation can help us to work through these. Jackie's script is challenging in an exciting way. She writes in a style that leaves blanks to be filled, she raises the bar for the performers to use every skill, even including optional lines in the script - it is creative, innovative, and leaves some moments up to the director to create. Theatre lovers from all styles of theatre will find this show entertaining. The immediacy of theater to tell a story is there, and the language is accessible."
