From the

DIRECTOR

Dear friends, Director's notes are a strange thing.

I believe theatre should exist in its own beautiful, ephemeral state without a director's description to prepare you for what you are about to witness.

Our job as artists and storytellers is to do as Hamlet instructed the players: "to hold as 'twere the mirror up to nature: to show virtue her feature, scorn her own image, and the very age and body of the time his form and pressure."



I can't tell you what you see in the mirror. That is your own experience. You see what you want to see. What you need to see. Your view is yours and yours alone. Sometimes what you see is just the product of your inner voice, your upbringing, or your social circle.

Theatre encourages and allows you to see things in the mirror that you didn't know were there. Oskar Eustice says that theatre allows us to build our "emotional muscle of empathy."

The mirror that theatre holds up gives audiences the ability to share, understand and care about others' emotions. You may never lose a child. You may never be abandoned by your parents. You may never struggle with your marriage. Experiences that unfold onstage may be foreign to you, but at the root of every story is a shared humanity, and hearing people that HAVE had these experiences will open your heart to the concept of Radical Empathy.

Cheryl Strayed defines radical empathy as "striving to always hold others in unconditional positive regard. It means assuming that most of us are essentially good at our core, that we are all worthy of love and forgiveness. In action, it means willingness to contemplate the decisions and actions of others with consideration rather than condemnation, with compassion rather than scorn. Having radical empathy is not about letting people off the hook for their misdeeds and mistakes, but rather holding them—and ourselves—to a higher standard. It's about saying, 'I believe we are capable of doing better, of being kinder, braver, more honest, and more generous—even after we have failed to do so.'

- I hope tonight you hear the raw, open bravery of the letter writers.
- · I hope you hear Sugar's honest, beautiful responses.
- I hope that you look into the mirror that is held up and see things you didn't know were there.
- · I hope that you leave the theatre changed.
- I hope you walk away and practice radical empathy.

Loosely based on the story of Franz Kafka and the missing doll, Kafka consoled a girl who had lost her doll in the park by sending her letters, supposedly written by the doll, recounting her exciting adventures around the world. Eventually, Kafka sent her a different doll, passing it off as the original one. Enclosed was a note he wrote. It reads: "I have seen the world and it has changed me. What I have learned is everything you love will probably be lost eventually. But in the end, if you stay open, love will return to you in another form."

This simple parable is the stepping-off point for a journey of love, loss, transformation, adventure, and growth.

Playwright's Note

The letters are real... I thought, as I read Cheryl Strayed's incredibly moving book, Tiny Beautiful Things. People wrote these letters. A few years ago, author Cheryl Strayed gave advice as Sugar for the literary website, The Rumpus, and later collected the letters into a book. Journalist Marshall Heyman gave his friend, director Thomas Kail, the book and Tommy gave it to me suggesting it could become a play. As I read the letters exchanged, I wept, smiled, and was astonished by the raw and extraordinary candor. Sugar and the writers of the letters reveal themselves and we find ourselves in their conundrums and sorrows, in their lives lived and roads traveled. I yearned to be as bold, audacious, and willful. As I adapted the book into a play, I found the words so illuminating that I grieved and moved on from certain events of my own. Still, if I had one letter to write, it would be: Dear Sugar, I hope to be as brave as the writers of the letters and as open as Cheryl Strayed. -- Nia Vardalos

Her artwork explores the beauty found in the imperfect and the richness of a patina that emerges with the passage of time. Her "no-mindedness" mark-making paintings are influenced by landscape, architecture, and music. Using multiple layers of color, line, texture, scribbles, dribbles, scraps, and flaws, in essence, compressing time to emphasize the idea that "perfection" is an illusion and in fact, is not a sustainable human condition.
